Leeds Castle

Although Leeds dates back to 1119 and was made a royal palace during the reign of Henry VIII, your Leeds experience will have a timeless feel. King Henry was a lover of garden mazes and the one at Leeds is one of the best. It is an amusing way to test your sense of direction, but leave enough time to find your way, though.

Canterbury

Should you choose to make a pilgrimage into Canterbury, it will not be the first. Long before cruise ship guests, Chaucer's knights and millers and nuns were telling tales on their way to England's ecclesiastic mecca, where Thomas Becket was murdered. Canterbury Cathedral is at once glorious and miraculous. It is a grand example of the earliest gothic architecture in England and it is astonishing that it has survived the targeted wrath of Henry VIII and Nazi bombers.

Visby Highlights

Churches

Gotland has an amazing collection of medieval churches, 93 of which are still in use today! A few still have medieval glass paintings and a majority of them contain medieval frescos. Inside the towered walls of Visby, you can visit the Cathedral of St. Mary as well as the ruins of ten others.

Fornsal Museum

It takes five floors of a mid-18th century distillery to house all the exhibits of this impressive museum. By the time you finish your tour, you will have experienced 8000 years of local history. Highlights of the Fornsal collection include: picture stones that pre-date the Vikings, 6000 year old grave stones, treasures of silver, medieval wooden sculptures and a medieval trading booth display used by the burghers of Visby to deal in goods such as furs, honey and tar.

Welcome to the "Capital of the Fjords." Norway's second largest city serves as the gateway to the many deep, water-filled wedges that slice through this region's landscape. Bergen is a compact city built on a peninsula surrounded by seven lush, green hills dotted with colorful, wooden buildings of old. As the northern hub of the Hanseatic League trade alliance, Bergen gained its reputation as an important European port centuries ago. Today this misty, harbor town impresses visitors as a cultural center of museums and music.

Bergen Highlights

Gamle Bergen

Gamle means "old," so Gamle Bergen is the open-air museum of historic Bergen. Forty 18th and 19th century wooden houses make up the museum. The well-kept exteriors of classic Norwegian architecture, manicured gardens and cobbled pathways give way to interiors restored to different decors detailing life from that time. Many find the guided tour quite amusing.

Troldhaugen

Edvard Grieg, the romantic composer of Peer Gynt, wrote music of a certain time and place. The time was the mid 19th century and Troldhaugen was the place. Troldhaugen was the

home of Norway's one great composer. You will find Grieg's charming villa just as he left it. Added to the grounds, though, are a Chamber Music Hall and the Grieg museum.

Norway's fourth largest city has looked to bounty of the sea to make it prosper. In the 19th century, Stavanger was Norway's sardine canning capital and since the fish population has been depleted, its title has changed to "Oil Capital." Gamle (Old) Stavanger is northern Europe's best-preserved neighborhood of early 19th century clapboard homes along gas lamp-lit, cobblestone streets.

Preikestolen/Lysefjord

One of the most dramatic views in all of Norway is from 2000 feet straight above the deep blue waters of Lysefjord atop Preikestolen or "Pulpit Rock." From up here where the golden eagles fly, you can spy Stavanger, waterfalls and fjord after fjord. Do not be surprised to see reindeer and elk on the easy two-hour hike to this popular rock platform. A more casual way to enjoy Lysefjord's scenery is by the Clipper sightseeing boat.

Sandnes/Kongeparken

Spend a day in Sandnes and Kongeparken and we guarantee you will feel like a kid again. Sandnes is home to a major bicycle maker and the countryside surrounding Sandnes begs to be explored by rented bike. Kongeparken is Norway's largest leisure park with Scandinavia's largest bobsleigh ride. It is hard to miss; simply look for the largest Gulliver you have ever seen. He is a football field long and filled with fun.

The very ground on which Dalt Vila's cathedral stands was previously home to a mosque, a paleo-Christian church, a Roman temple of Mercury and a Carthaginian temple.

Formentera

Just four miles from Ibiza by boat service, Formentera offers seclusion and fine, long beaches and coves. Scooters provide the best access to beaches with names like Illetes, Levant and Es Pujols.

Everyone wants to come to Mallorca. First it was the Carthaginians, Romans and Vandals, then Byzantines and Moors, and today it is artists and writers, Europeans on holiday and even Spanish royalty. And why shouldn't they; the largest of Spain's Mediterranean islands is a great escape for a little peace and quiet. The climate is mild and the blue-green sea is magnificent. There are white, sandy beaches, caves and villages locked in time all begging to be explored.

Mallorca Highlights**Cathedral**

You cannot miss Palma's great, medieval cathedral, nor should you miss it. This mountain of a gothic masterpiece perched above the medieval quarter is at once remarkable and rare. Built between the 13th and 16th centuries and then touched up by Gaudi in the early 20th century, this cathedral dedicated to San Sebastian is one of the world's largest.

Chopin and Mallorca

Frederic Chopin called life in Mallorca "delicious." When the classical composer and his wife, writer George Sand, wintered here, they kicked off an era of holidaying in Mallorca. Writers and artists have been escaping here ever since. A favorite destination for visitors is the Carthusian Monastery where the two spent their honeymoon. Some of Chopin's most enjoyed music was written here.

Vintage Madeira wines achieve their special character by estufagem - being "cooked" for six months by the sun's rays - and then fortified with brandy and aged for at least twenty-two years. There are four principle types of Madeira: Sercial – an amber, dry wine; Verdelho – a medium-dry, tawny wine; Bual – medium sweet alternative to port; and Malmsey – a rich dark wine. One can purchase a vintage wine for every decade going back to the mid-19th century.

The Monte Toboggan

"Exhilarating," exclaimed Hemingway! He was referring to a quite unique thrill ride that thousands of Madeira's visitors have been engaging in since 1850. It is a speedy, two-mile highway descent from Monte to Funchal sliding the distance in a wicker chariot of sorts with wooden runners. Toboggan drivers steer and brake from the rear.

Sardinia is a relaxing, coastal getaway. The second largest island in the Mediterranean has over a thousand miles of coastline made up of romantic coves, dunes and sandy beaches.

St. Mark's Square

It has been named the "Golden Church," because of its ornate decorations of marble and gilded mosaics. The supreme example of grandiose Venetian gothic is the Doge's Palace. We recommend going to the top of the Campanile, a 100 meters high tower that affords the finest view of all Venice.

Islands around Venice

Venice is famous for its glasswork and its lace. The finest examples of these arts are found on Venice's outlying islands. The island of Murano has been the center of Venetian glass blowing since the late 13th century, while Burano is your best source for Venetian lace. Torcello was the first settlement in the lagoon and it is worth a visit to see the magnificent 11th century Byzantine cathedral.

Haifa, on Israel's Mediterranean coast, is your gateway to the Holy Land. Many religions draw their faith from this region's storied past. Haifa is itself a pleasant, tiered city on the wooded slopes of Mt. Carmel. It is Israel's third largest city and center of technology. Explore Elijah's Cave on Mt. Carmel, where the prophet Elijah hid from King Ahab.

Caesarea

Excavations continue here at one of Israel's great archeological sites, as does the development of a modern coastal resort. What has been dug up along a 3km stretch of coast are elements of an ancient port established by Herod the Great. You can see remnants of the Roman aqueducts. The Roman amphitheatre has been turned into a concert arena! Best preserved, though, is the citadel of the walled Crusader city.

The Galilee

Come here to walk in the footsteps of Jesus or simply walk the greenest land in all of Israel. Surrounding the Sea of Galilee are old synagogues, the ruins of Crusader fortresses and countless points of great Christian religious significance. Accounts of Jesus' life hold that he spent his youth and period of ministry here. In Nazareth, the Basilica of Annunciation marks the spot where Christians believe Mary was visited by the angel Gabriel.

Istanbul is a very unique destination. It is at once west and east, and it has played a large part in shaping the history of both. The names of Byzantium and Constantinople may have changed and the Byzantine and Ottoman empires may have come and gone, but this place is eternal. There is much to do and see here. Tour the Blue Mosque, Hippodrome, Aya Sofya (the grand Church of Holy Wisdom) and Topkapi Palace in Sultanahmet (Old Istanbul.) Ferry up the Bosphorus and end the day with a relaxing Turkish bath.

Topkapi Sarayi

In 1453, the Byzantine Empire came down at the hands of Mehmet the Conqueror's Ottoman Turks. In that same year, the Topkapi Palace went up. No expense was spared. Room after room was intricately adorned in opulence. From within its walls, sultans ruled the empire until the 19th century. Visitors are allowed to tour the four courts of the Palace in all their splendor. Be sure to see the harem and the staggering treasury of gold, gems, Islamic relics and the cloak of Mohammed.

Kapali Carsi

This is Istanbul's Covered Market, widely known as the Grand Bazaar, which resembles a medieval mall. The Grand Bazaar is a maze of shops, over 4400 lining 65 streets. It is a great place to loose yourself shopping for fantastic finds. The Grand Bazaar is divided by category. There are sections for carpets, jewelry, clothing, silverware and much more.

Stepping ashore in Alexandria, Egypt, you cannot help but feel the history of this place, the role it has had in helping shape western civilization. Alexandria was a creation of Alexander the Great. In Alexandria, the Mediterranean world possessed the greatest library ever known and one of the Seven Wonders of the World. Cleopatra ruled from here, so too, did the Romans and Napoleon. Nearby in one of the greatest tank battles ever, the tide of World War II first shifted. It is said we must learn from the past; Alexandria is a great place to study.

Greco-Roman Museum

Since very little of historic Alexandria has survived to the 21st century, a visit to Alexandria's Greco-Roman Museum is a fabulous way to bring it back to life. It seems with over 40,000 artifacts on display in these 24 rooms, patrons do have much to relive. Two of the highlights are the carved heads of Alexander and lanterns depicting the pharaohs.

The Pyramids of Giza

Even with the aid of modern construction equipment, it still boggles the mind to think how the great pyramids and Sphinx could have been built? Their sheer size, genius in design, and mystery of purpose stagger the imagination. Egypt is the pyramids. The pyramids are Egypt. And to stand before them will complete your visit.

Palermo, where Celebrity anchors, was at one time the world's second largest city. Under Arab rule in the 10th century, only Constantinople was its rival. Before that it was Phoenician and afterward an important Norman metropolis, so there is much history for you to discover during your stay. We also recommend the fine gardens near the gulf. The gardens of Villa Giulia, planted in 1777, are especially worthy of a stroll.

The Temples of Agrigento

When the Greek poet Pindar arrived in Agrigento, he declared it "the most beautiful city of mortals." That was 2500 years ago. Much of that beauty remains to this day. Photographs of the wonderful ancient temples and tombs belong in your scrapbook. The best examples are: Temple of Olympian Zeus, the largest known Doric temple; Temple of Hera; and one of the best preserved temples in the world, Temple of the Concordia.

Etna and the Aeolian Volcanoes

There is something about the potential of an active volcano's awesome outburst that intrigues us. Volcano tourism is evidence of that. Sicily's Mt. Etna is the largest active volcano in Europe and the Aeolian Islands off Sicily's north coast are a hot bed of constant rumblings. For those wish to pass on a climb to a crater top, mineral-enriched, curative waters and mud baths await.

Of the large Mediterranean islands, Corsica has the fewest inhabitants. In fact, visitors can outnumber Corsicans six to one. Corsicans may be French in name, have an Italian-like dialect and way of life, but they are fiercely independent people proud of their ruggedly beautiful "mountain in the sea." Corsica today is lively ports, peaceful walks in the mountains and secluded coves, sandy beaches, fishing villages, vineyards, forests and jagged headlands – all basking in the fragrance of the flowering *maquis* that covers the island.

Birthplace of Napoleon

Before he ruled France and attempted to conquer the world, Napoleon Bonaparte was a Corsican. That seems appropriate, as Corsicans are known as a fiery people. Ajaccio was his home until he went off to military school in France. There are tours given of his childhood home, Maison Bonaparte, and his baptismal font in the Cathedral Notre-Dame-de la-

Misericorde. Early Italian paintings, obtained during the Italian campaign, hang in Palais Fesch, the mansion of Napoleon's uncle.

Corse du Sud

The southern department of Corsica, which includes Ajaccio, is where you want to be to enjoy the island's best beaches. Plage de Palombaggia and Plage de Pinarello are the two long, white beaches most often described as Corsica's best. While in Bonifacio's 12th century citadel at the southern tip of Corsica, see if you can see Sardinia.

Stockholm, Sweden is surely one of Europe's most attractive and civilized capitals. Fifty bridges connect this city situated on fourteen islands. A mixture of medieval, renaissance and modern architecture, Stockholm casts a stately skyline. Much of the city has a pastoral, wide-open feel. That is not surprising, considering urban parks comprise one third of Stockholm. The home of the Nobel Prize is a city with an enormous royal palace, fashionable neighborhoods and more than eighty museums and galleries.

The Vasa

Amazing! The Vasa was the greatest warship on any sea... for a few minutes. Three hundred years before the Titanic, it suffered the same fate. On her maiden voyage, she tipped over because there wasn't enough ballast to counter the weight of her 64 guns. Cut to April, 1961. All of Sweden shuts down to watch the Vasa raised in one piece to the surface. When you visit the Vasa Museum today, you can view the world's only intact 17th century ship, adorned with many of its 700 sculptures and ornaments.

The Attractions of Djurgarden

Stockholm's urban national park contains the cities finest museums. Five hundred years of Swedish culture are on display in the palatial Nordic Museum. Skansen is the very popular open-air museum, which shows off folk exhibits from all over Sweden, such as windmills and an entire town. You are invited to take part in traditional activities. Djurgarden also has a zoo, an unusual aquarium and the Grona Lunds Tivoli, an old-fashioned amusement park.

Stockholm is very easy to see by bus. Another great way to see the sights is to cruise the extensive waterways in a glass-enclosed boat. On tours of the city's historic and modern districts, you get to see the Royal Palace, houses from the 15th century in medieval Old Town, panoramic views of the stately skyline, the parklands and attractions of Djurgarden and the Blue Hall in City Hall, where the Nobel Prize festivities are held.

Tallinn, the capital city of Estonia, sits on a bay across the Gulf of Finland from Helsinki. Pirita

East of Old Town at the mouth of the Pirita River is the site of the 1980 Olympic Yachting Center. If there isn't a regatta going on when you get there, start your own with rented rowboats. There are popular, clean beaches nearby for watching the long summer sunset on the bay.

Our Tallinn tours let you explore one of the Baltic's prettiest cities by foot or coach. Either way, you will get to see the interesting sites of upper and lower Old Town. One of your tour options goes out to Rocco-Al-Mare. This is a sixty building, open-ai-red folk museum that presents 18th and 19th century rural life from all over Estonia.

There's a whole lotta bubbling going on underneath the east side of Sao Miguel. In the Furnas area, the locals have put all that geothermal activity to good use. Therapeutic mud and mineral water from the steaming geysers and hot, bubbling springs are used to pamper you at the spa resort. Later, you can swim in a volcanically heated lake and eat stew cook in pots underground.

Whale-Watching

What makes the Azores such a special whale-watching destination is the rare species of cetaceans that you are likely to see here. Twenty species of whales and dolphins feed in the unpolluted, warm, Gulf Stream waters of the mid-Atlantic. Small, fast boats will get you almost as close as Captain Ahab got to great sperm whales that have surfaced for a little spy-hopping.

According to legend, it was the tears of two lovers who had to part that filled the blue and green lakes in the Sete Cidades Crater. The Frevo'

Be prepared for the Frevo', a traditional folkloric dance that can start up anywhere. Danced with an umbrella, it looks like a cross between the Samba and Capoeira, a form of Brazilian martial arts. You are always welcome to join in the festivities.

When you see a sign for a "Churrascaria," it is time to eat. Churrascaria is a Brazilian indoor cookout. Skewers of meat (beef, pork, chicken) are cooked over charcoal pits Brazilian cowboy style. Some restaurants offer all you can eat. The waiters will continue to bring skewers of meats until you beg them to stop.

It is a playground for celebrities, affluent Argentineans and European royalty.

Mate

You are very likely to see Uruguayans sipping from a small decorative gourd that they carry around with them. These gourds contain Mate. Mate is a stimulating brew made from the leaves of a wild evergreen plant akin to holly. This tea is reputed to have healthful properties. The custom of passing the gourd to a guest for a sip and then back to the host has been part of Uruguayan culture since pre-Columbian times.

In the center of the Punta Arenas plaza is a statue of Magellan. Magellan is the appropriate hero to celebrate here in tranquil "Sandy Point," for he discovered the strait on which Chile's southernmost city lies. After Punta Arenas, South America crumbles into innumerable islands and Tierra del Fuego. Yugoslavian sheep barons were the original pioneers of this remote region with its stunning vistas.

Punta Arenas Highlights

Museums

A region as unique as Magallanes deserves to have its history and natural history on display. Some of Punta Arenas' finer museums include: Magallanes Regional Museum, a Patagonian mansion as it was at the turn of the century; Salesiano Museum, an interesting collection of flora and fauna and artifacts of extinct aboriginal cultures; and Recuerdo Museum, an open-air museum with sculptures detailing early settlement life.

Penguins

The population of metro Punta Arenas is 270,000. This figure takes into account the 150,000 penguin inhabitants of Monumento Natural Los Pingüinos, 25 miles north of Punta Arenas on Magdalena Island. Tours to see the 50,000 nests that make up the Magellanic penguin colony are not over-publicized, which keeps away crowds and makes the excursion that much more of a must see.

Puerto Montt is the capital of Lake District founded, as many other villages in this region were, by German immigrants in 1853. It retains the feel of a small northern German town with wooden houses and fishing boats in that style. Alerce Trees

They stand as much as 150 feet high with diameters of up to 10 feet. Patagonia cypress, as they are also known, are thought to be the southern cousin of the California sequoia. Take a dozen of your newfound acquaintances to Alerce Andino National Park and see if you can all hold hands around one of these awesome giants.

Llanquihue/Osorno/Petrohue

Llanquihue is a big, beautiful, blue lake – Chile's second largest. Petrohue is a river with several cascading falls. Osorno is a glowing, ice-covered volcano that dominates the horizon. They are all located just north of Puerto Montt and beg to be seen and photographed.

Valparaiso sits on a perfect bay harbor, ringed by the port's seventeen cerros (hills) and the snow-covered Cordillera peaks in the distance. Just as the European elite have their French Riviera for their playground, South America's privileged retreat to their Vina, the center of attention along the Chilean Riviera. This international resort area has a moderate climate much the same as its Mediterranean cousin. The beaches are golden. The nightlife is exciting. The promenades are alive with shops and cafés. And the great gardens are open for all to see.
